

Getting to zero will require coordinated action and additional investment



The world is making inroads against child marriage, with an acceleration of progress in the past 10 years

If progress from the last 10 years continues,

there will be


+120 million child brides

If progress in the past 10 years is doubled,

still, nearly

110 million girls

will become child brides in the next decade

In Latin America and the Caribbean, where there has been no progress in the past decade, the stagnation must be overcome to bring the region on track towards elimination



If the risk of child marriage **remains** at today's levels,
